

We asked NMBC followers what they thought about the numerous proposed statewide mandated wage increases. Here's what they had to say:

"When a person owns a business, they understand why a minimum wage is destructive to any economy. It is a hold-over from the time that price controls were put into effect to fix the economy. It didn't work then and it doesn't work now. Because it doesn't work and harms small businesses, the fact that it still exists tells me that it is a tool being used by politicians to stay in office. Until the people are educated enough to know how an economy actually works, they will continue to support the idea that they have the power to tell business owners how to run their businesses. NM is becoming a miniature California."

"\$15 MW = 38% price increase \$9 MW = ?%"

"Minimum wage (MW) should be eliminated. Minimum wage increase unemployment every time. When MW goes up local prices for food, dining out, and other services increases and consumer buying goes down. The person getting the wage increase gets back in the same boat.

Minimum wage jobs covers a small part of the population. Those jobs weren't meant to support a family. Most MW jobs are service jobs and doesn't require a lot of skill. It doesn't make any sense to pay someone with low skill sets a high wage. Most small employers do not have a high profit margin and cannot afford the cost increases. Several businesses in my area have laid-off employees because our city raised the MW rate.

"NO!"

"New Mexico suffers from a lack of skilled workers which is one of the reasons it does not attract businesses to the State. Raising wage minimum, while it helps in the short run with a few extra dollars, does not solve the skills problem nor does it encourage an upward mobility.

New Mexicans have to get serious about educating its youth and preparing them for jobs that are meaningful and provide a living wage. Raising the minimum wage is a political feel good maneuver – it does not solve the deep-rooted problem of the State's high school dropout rate, lack of vocational high schools, teen pregnancy, and drugs to name a few.

The business community and the State Legislature should work together – they can start with tax breaks for businesses who provide skills building or tuition reimbursement to their employees to close the skills gap in New Mexico. Improve our schools!!! (what a concept)

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"Wendy's restaurant has already announced they will put in food kiosks in 1000 stores by the end of 2017. Pretty sure people would rather keep their job then have a machine replace them."

"Suppose a man is stuck in a deep hole. There is a sort of ladder, but he's having trouble getting started going up it. Along comes a Liberal/Progressive.... who says, "Here, let me help you -- I'll knock out the bottom two rungs! Pretty stupid, right?
