Income also falls into recurring and nonrecurring categories, which is a consideration for the expenses ... and all three of the other answer apply at different times. From a 30,000 foot level, I'd like to see a bottoms up evaluation of where the money goes, and the services provided by the state (and by whom) - prioritize our efforts and put funding and effort where it do the best job of meeting the goals of the State. (education, public safety, general management, facility maintenance ...). Some areas of state government would most likely expand, some would contract or go away. Once we have that template, if there are surplus nonrecurring revenues I'd put it toward infrastructure desperately needed by the state - roads, bridges, dam repair, construction/reconstruction-repair/consolidation of needed

state facilities and budget for their maintenance. If there are surplus funds remaining, a strong consideration is to return tax funds to our citizens.

Briefly explain your answer :

Assuming the current distribution algorithm doesn't change, then an equal distribution is most equitable and least subject to political favoritism. That said, I think the current system needs to be changed and focus on funding projects with broad spread impacts - roads and communication infrastructure come to mind, but we also need a formula that enables the legislator to focus funding to fulfill critical needs within their communities or within other communities. A flexible formula that meets critical needs - large and small.

Please explain your position:

Specifically, the ETA is an overreach. Renewable energy has a strong future but there remain significant shortcomings in legislation like the ETA - it assumes technologies that do not yet exist (adequate energy storage), it fails to acknowledge the need for base production, ignores the options available to the State with micro nuclear technologies, and guaranteed by legislation that the County of San Juan and the community of BlueWater would be destroyed.

I can attest to the need for regulatory oversight by government entities to reassure the public as to the safety of drinking water and proper handling and disposal of waste products. I can also attest that some regulations are "aggressively" created or interpreted beyond the original intent of the legislation. We should rely as much on science as we do 'sense' (or lack thereof). I have found that people of the land (ranchers, farmers) take care of the environment ... in part, because it is their livelihood and their future - the same is true of water purveyors like community water systems - regulations should help guide them in their efforts but not be obstacles to achieving good deeds.

Obsolete and overly aggressive regulations not only cost us (the public) money, they impede progress. For example, current mining law and regulation requires retention of restoration bonds well beyond their need by not acknowledging the use of technology and organics that enables us to accelerate restoration programs by a factor of five (taking two years vice ten or more). Every written regulation has its day - it is our duty to review them for sufficiency and to make them current. Such actions will make NM more attractive to economic growth.

I've accepted the mandates that provide for workmans' comp, overtime and unemployment insurance - and as a businessman, I chose to provide health and disability insurance, vacation, paid time off, and a Thanksgiving turkey but the structure and economic value of my business enabled me to do those things.

Wages should be determined by allowing the free market or supply/demand to determine an appropriate amount , Please explain your answer: Businesses don't exist to provide people jobs - businesses exist to provide product or service that others will buy, and often employees (skilled or otherwise) are needed to meet the needs of the business. Each business has an economic value to the owner, to share holders, to customers and to the economy. Wages should be based on an algorithm that takes that value into account. That said, The Fair Labor Act of 1936 settled the issue, and minimum wage is a fact of life. In my opinion, the minimum wage has become as much of a ceiling to wages than the floor it was intended to be. It has placed the market force of economic value and labor at a disadvantage.
