No. The scale of current environmental regulations are overly restrictive. Forcing residents to curtail or restrict their usage of energy or restricting power generation to certain types of energy sources is inappropriate and dangerous. The threat of blackouts and brownouts due to the Energy Transition Act, the ending of natural gas powered plants, and the restrictions placed on power companies to not have access to clean nuclear power are all instances where New Mexico's environmental regulations are overly restrictive and not based on the best science. As well, bio-fuels such as ethanol are not environmentally sound and affect the availability of food to an extent that is not rational. Ethanol production involves loss of food producing lands, wastes water, and is highly inefficient and costly. Far better to have a more reliable and more affordable food supply than the minimal gains of ethanol production.
